

MAG Partners, Safanad and Penn South break ground on 200,000 s/f mixed-use project

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Manhattan, NY MAG Partners broke ground on their 188-unit, mixed-use project at 335 Eighth Ave. in partnership with Penn South (also known as Mutual Redevelopment Houses, Inc.). Dignitaries including council member Erik Bottcher, helped to mark the occasion. Thirty percent of the new building's units will be reserved for low- and middle-income residents under the Affordable NY Program. The project, which is co-financed by MAG Partners and global holding company Safanad, will also offer ground-level retail space, including a 23,000 s/f Lidl supermarket.

The COOKFOX Architects-designed building will stand on the northwest corner of 28th St. and Eighth Ave., at the former site of a retail complex that included a supermarket and tennis club. The 200,000 s/f, seven-story building matches neighborhood context, mirroring and updating the redbrick aesthetic of the Penn South towers surrounding the development. The project is slated for completion fall 2025.

In addition to providing affordable and market-rate housing, a new grocery store and construction jobs, the ground lease and development will support the continued affordability of Penn South, a fifteen-building, limited-equity cooperative home to nearly 5,000 residents. Urban Atelier Group will lead construction.

"Penn South has been a model of urban affordability, quality of life, and community cohesion for over 60 years. We're proud to partner with them on this project that not only supports Penn South but brings significant new affordability and quality-of-life enhancements to the entire Chelsea community," said MaryAnne Gilmartin, founder and CEO of MAG Partners.
